


## **Philly Beat**

Food, neighborhoods, and nightlife in the City of Brotherly Love

At KieranTimberlake, the city is at the heart of what we do. It's where we live and work, but it's also where we unwind, where we find inspiration, and where we explore. We've put together a guide\* to some of our favorite places to help you get the most out of your visit. Be prepared to walk and eat at all times!

#### **Fishtown**

Since it's a hub of the burgeoning food scene in Philadelphia, Fishtown is the perfect place to take a food and drink tour. Start with the draft latte at LaColombe, then stroll up Frankford Ave to Pizza Brain for a slice of Felix Huppert. Check out the historic former residence of a Union Army doctor designed by Frank Furness before heading over to Little Baby's for some odd ice cream flavors. For a dinnertime tour, stop in at Fette Sau, Barcade, and Sketch Burger before you end your night with a soft pretzel and a stein around a fire pit at Frankford Hall, a German beer garden.






### **Northern Liberties**

Head over to KieranTimberlake's office and visit *Drawn* + *Quartered*, our exhibit of full-scale prototypes and mock-ups. Break for lunch and check out **Honey's Sit** 'n Eat. It's cash-only and you may have to wait in line, but the latkes and challah French toast are not to be missed. Afterwards, walk off the carbs in the footsteps of Louis Kahn, who once played organ at the former silent movie theater at 6th and Poplar Streets. Or, venture to North Bowl for drinks and bowling – bumpers are recommended, but not required.






## Old City

Wander around the historic district and explore landmarks like Independence Hall, the Liberty Bell, and the quaint, contrasting homes on Elfreth's Alley, the country's oldest continuously inhabited residential street. Post up on a hammock at Spruce Street Harbor Park along the Delaware River before heading over to Fork for dinner. No summer night is complete without waiting in the epic line for Franklin Fountain's homemade, old-fashioned ice cream—it is so worth it! Cap off your historic day with a drink at Independence Beer Garden, nestled among the concrete columns of the Rohm & Hass Headquarters building.






### South Street

Wind through artist Isaiah Zagar's **Magic Gardens** as you head east down **South Street**. Take in the sights and smells, and be sure to visit **Jim's**, a Philadelphia favorite for cheesesteaks\* that is nestled amongst the tattoo parlors and dive bars. If you don't enter into a food coma, drop by the **Twisted Tail** for drinks and live blues.

\*Like a true Philadelphian, order in 3 words or fewer. American, Provolone, or wiz? Mushrooms? With or without onions? You want: cheesesteak made with wiz and onions; You say: Wiz wit; You want: cheesesteak made with provolone and mushrooms, hold the onion; You say: provolone, mushrooms, witout.






#### Market East

Roam around **Reading Terminal Market** to experience the array of the city's food scene. Our top pick is the roast pork sandwich from DiNic's. Visit Philadelphia's iconic **City Hall** and check out the observation deck for amazing, 360-degree views of the city. Stop by the adjacent **Dilworth Park** to see the building from another perspective, or continue down Broad Street to experience a mix of architectural styles. We personally love the **Pennsylvania Academy of the Fine Arts (PAFA)**, the **Academy of Music**, the **Union League**, and **Suzanne Roberts Theater**. After your tour, stop at **Cheu Noodle Bar** for the city's best fancy ramen.






### Bella Vista

Cross your fingers for a sunny day and journey down to the South Philly neighborhood of Bella Vista. Peruse the oldest open air market in America, the **Italian**Market, during the day for shopping, eating (of course), and people watching. Paesano's is a favorite for lunch, while Fante's Kitchen Shop is a must-see for culinary enthusiasts.






# East Passyunk

Afterwards, stop by **Stateside** for a whiskey or bourbon tasting, or harness your inner Beyoncé during karaoke at **Ray's Happy Birthday Bar**.






#### Rittenhouse

Start off a late afternoon with a tour through the Mutter Museum, a collection of medical artifacts and oddities not meant for the squeamish. Picnic in Rittenhouse Square with some treats from DiBruno Brothers. Ask nicely at the back counter, and you'll find yourself tasting impeccable international cheeses, each with a story. If you're looking for something more off the beaten path, step into John Collins Park to see one of the city's tinier urban parks. Finish off the day with drinks at Ranstead Room, a speakeasy with some of the best bartenders around.






#### Museum Row

In a world without museum fatigue we'd tell you to hit all of the museums along the Parkway. Instead, start with a hearty brunch at **Sabrina's** before spending a few hours gazing at the Picasso and Van Gogh paintings at the **Barnes Foundation**. Make a reservation ahead of time to ensure you get in. Afterwards, relax in the **Rodin Museum** garden before heading off for a bike ride along the **Schuylkill River Trail** with **Indego** bike share. No trip to Philadelphia is complete without the obligatory run up "The **Rocky Steps"** and a picture with the mythical icon himself at the Philadelphia Museum of Art.






# **University City**

It's easy to get sucked into Center City, but don't forget about the other side of the Schuylkill. Explore the rich architecture at The University of Pennsylvania, including the the Architectural Archives in the Fisher Fine Arts Library, Richards Medical Laboratories, and the Irvine Auditorium. The University Museum of Archaeology and Anthropology is also worth a visit. For dinner, get sushi at coZara and finish off with dark and stormy gelato from Capogiro.





### Fairmount Park

Start out with a tour of the landmark Eastern State Penitentiary, known for its wagon-wheel plan and massive stone walls. Then drive (or bike) up Kelly Drive along the Schuylkill River Trail to Wissahickon Valley Park for a couple of hours. The 1,800-acre park has 57 miles of hiking, biking, and horseback riding trails, as well as a number of historical buildings, bridges, and landmarks. Pack a lunch and picnic there, or head to the Valley Green Inn for history and a meal.
